### **Racist Trees: Local journalism making a difference**

How does local journalism make a difference? It tells the stories that matter to our friends and families, communities and towns.

That's the case in the telling of the "Racist Trees" story in Palm Springs.

Starting in 2017, *The Desert Sun* began reporting on a wall of tall,



dense tamarisk trees that left residents of a predominantly Black neighborhood feeling isolated from their own city. The trees concealed their homes from the neighboring Tahquitz Creek Golf Course and blocked their views of Palm Springs' iconic San Jacinto Mountains. For years, residents viewed the trees as a racist symbol of segregation and demanded that they be removed. The newspaper's reporting inspired a documentary, "*Racist Trees*," that debuted at the Palm Springs International Film Festival in 2023.

Now, CVJF and the Palm Springs Black History Committee are hosting a special screening of *"Racist Trees"* at the Palm Springs Cultural Center, 2300 E. Baristo Road, at 3 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 16.

Join us for an afternoon that showcases local journalism and learn what has happened since the story first came to light. Tickets are available at <u>www.cvjf.org</u>. If you join our Fourth Estate Membership Program by Friday, you will be eligible to attend the event for free – a \$28 value.

The film's producers, residents of the Crossley Tract neighborhood, and the editor of *The Desert Sun* will participate in a panel discussion and audience Q&A after the film.

No Joke: There's a new date to 'Laugh Out Loud' with political cartoonist Mike Thompson



Yes, award-winning political cartoonist, Mike Thompson, had to cancel his appearance at the Palm Springs Library in December due to a family emergency – but we've got him back!

Thompson will now appear at the library, 300 S. Sunrise Way, at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, March 18. Fourth Estate members will be invited to a reception to meet Thompson before the program.

His free lecture, "Laughing Out Loud: The Provocative History of Political

Cartoons in America from Ben Franklin to Donald Trump," traces the evolution of political cartoons from America's colonial past to the present day.

Thompson is a four-time finalist for the Pulitzer Prize and a longtime editorial cartoonist and animator with USA TODAY and the Detroit Free Press. He won the Robert F. Kennedy Journalism Award for cartooning in 2017.

## Enthusiasm for the Coachella Valley Media Hall of Fame grows

NBC Palm Springs anchor Olivia Sandusky won Journalist of the Year, with *The Desert Sun* photographer Taya Gray receiving an honorable mention. Jennifer Cortez of *The Desert Sun* won the Rising Star award, with freelance journalist Jodeci Alcocer receiving an honorable mention.

Each of the journalism award winners received a cash prize underwritten by the California News Publishers Association.
